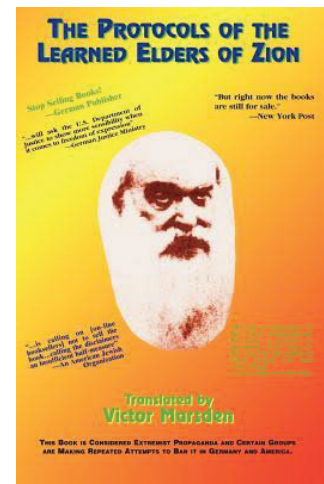
Conspiracy:

Protocols of the Elders of Zion

Claims a fabricated document proves Jewish plans for world domination. First published in Russia in 1903, it was used to incite antisemitic violence, including pogroms and Nazi propaganda.

FACT: The Protocols is a hoax, exposed as a forgery by The Times of London in 1921. Historians confirm it was created by the Tsarist secret police, plagiarized from satirical works like Maurice Joly's Dialogue in Hell. It has no basis in fact but persists in online conspiracy theories.

Conspiracy:

Zionist Occupied Government (ZOG)

Assertions that Jews secretly control the U.S. government, media, and economy, making America Israel's "puppet." This far-right trope resurfaced amid recent U.S. aid debates.

FACT: ZOG is a baseless 1970s white supremacist myth rooted in antisemitic stereotypes. U.S. policies, including aid to Israel, stem from geopolitical alliances, not secret cabals. Jews, about 2% of the U.S. population, hold diverse roles but do not dominate any sector.

Conspiracy:

Khazar Theory

Assertion that Ashkenazi Jews are not "real" Jews but descendants of Khazar converts from Eastern Europe/Mongolia, lacking ties to ancient Israel. Used to delegitimize Jewish identity and Israel's existence; popular in X posts and videos, despite genetic proof debunking the theory.

FACT: Genetic studies show Ashkenazi Jews share Middle Eastern ancestry with other Jewish groups, with no significant Khazar link. Popularized in the 1970s, this theory misinterprets limited medieval conversions and is refuted by historians as pseudoscience aimed at denying Jewish indigeneity. Archaeological and linguistic evidence confirms Jewish presence in Europe since Roman times.

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Conspiracy:

Rothschild

Claims the Rothschild family (portrayed as Jewish elites) controls global banking, created Israel in 1917 for money laundering/New World Order, and orchestrates wars/crises. Revived amid economic discussions and Israel-related events.

FACT: ZOG The Rothschilds were a 19th-century banking family whose influence has been exaggerated into antisemitic conspiracies; they do not control central banks or global events, as fact-checks show claims of owning most world wealth are false (their net worth is modest today). Theories trace to 19th-century conspiracy theories like the "Protocols," debunked as baseless by historians, with no evidence linking them to wars or modern crises beyond normal business activities. Dominate any sector.

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Conspiracy:

Holocaust Denial or Minimization

Assertions that the Holocaust is exaggerated, fake, or less severe than claimed, often compared unfavorably to other events like Allied bombings or Bolshevik actions. Gained traction via influencers and podcasts.

FACT: Nazi records, survivor testimonies, Allied liberations, and Nuremberg trials confirm six million Jewish deaths in ghettos, camps, and gas chambers. Denial relies on fabricated data, refuted by forensic evidence from sites like Auschwitz. Universally rejected by scholars, this pseudohistory persists in 2024-2025 via fringe influencers but is baseless.

Conspiracy:

Jews orchestrated the Bolshevik Revolution

Lies that Jews orchestrated the Russian Revolution as a genocide against Christians, with figures like Stalin secretly Jewish. Circulated in far-right spaces, linking to modern "anti-globalist" narratives.

FACT: Some Jews joined revolutionary movements due to Tsarist oppression, but they were a minority among Bolsheviks (e.g., Trotsky was Jewish; Lenin and Stalin were not). The Judeo-Bolshevism Conspiracy, used by Nazis to justify pogroms, ignores class-driven causes of the Revolution. Jews faced Soviet antisemitism, and claims of Stalin's Jewish ancestry are fabricated.

Conspiracy:

Replacement Theory

Claims Jews promote immigration and multiculturalism to "replace" white populations in Europe and the U.S. Chanted at the now infamous march in Charlottesville ([click link](#)) Amplified in by online extremists and tied to Israel critiques.

FACT: The so-called "Great Replacement" theory, popularized by French writer Renaud Camus, ignores well-documented demographic trends shaped by economics, migration patterns, and birth rates. Instead, it frames these natural changes as a deliberate Jewish plot. White supremacists have adopted this racist myth as a rallying cry, frequently targeting Jews. Historians trace its roots back to Nazi propaganda and debunk it as baseless fearmongering.

Conspiracy:

QAnon and Satanic Cabals

Theories that a Jewish-led elite (e.g., Soros, Rothschilds) runs a global pedophile network or secret religion like Frankism, controlling Hollywood, governments, and revolutions. Popular theory on platforms like X.

FACT: QAnon, emerging in 2017, blends antisemitic tropes like blood libels into baseless claims of a satanic cabal. Originating from 4chan hoaxes, its allegations of elite trafficking have no evidence and are debunked by investigations. Scholars dismiss it as paranoid fiction fueling extremism.

Conspiracy:

Israel Involved in 9/11 or JFK Assassination

Claims that Israel/Mossad orchestrated 9/11 or that AIPAC/Jews killed JFK. Resurfaced in conspiracy podcasts and posts linking to Middle East conflicts.

FACT: The 9/11 Commission attributes the attacks to al-Qaeda, with no evidence of Israeli involvement; dancing Israelis claims are debunked rumors. JFK's assassination, linked to Lee Harvey Oswald by the Warren Commission, has no credible Mossad connection. These theories, are rooted in anti-Zionist bias, not facts.

Conspiracy:

Jews Control Media/Hollywood

Tropes that Jews dominate entertainment and news to push agendas, including covering up crimes or promoting "degeneracy." Widespread in social media, often tied to celebrity deaths like Michael Jackson's.

FACT: Jews were prominent in early Hollywood due to exclusion from other industries, but they do not control it. Media ownership is corporate-driven, with diverse executives and market-driven decisions. This stereotype, echoing Nazi propaganda, is debunked by factcheckers as ignoring Jewish diversity and free speech dynamics.

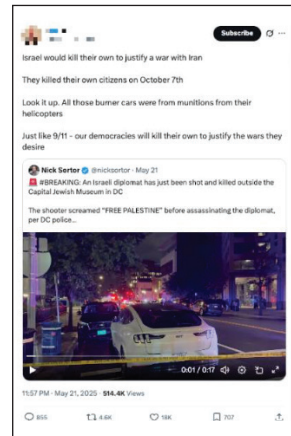
Conspiracy:

October 7 False Flag or Israeli Orchestration Allegations that Israel or Mossad staged the October 7, 2023, Hamas attacks

Claims that these attacks were a pretext for war or that atrocities were exaggerated. These claims are spread widely on social media.

FACT: Extensive evidence, including Hamas body camera footage, eyewitness accounts, forensic reports, and UN investigations, confirms Hamas and allied militants killed over 1,200 people and took hostages. Claims of Israeli orchestration lack evidence and echo antisemitic false-flag tropes..

Conspiracy:

Christian Zionism as Jewish Plot

Theory that support for Israel among Christians is manipulated via altered Bibles (e.g., Scofield) to destroy Christianity. Promoted by influencers critiquing U.S.-Israel ties.

FACT: Christian Zionism stems from evangelical theology, like dispensationalism by John Nelson Darby, interpreting biblical prophecies about Israel's restoration. The Scofield Bible (1909) reflects this, with no evidence of Zionist funding or anti-Christian edits. Historians reject conspiracy claims as antisemitic, ignoring genuine religious motivations.

Conspiracy:

The Star of David is a pagan or satanic symbol tied to child sacrifice

Assertion that Israel's flag symbol originates from child-sacrificing gods or demons, not Judaism. Gained views in videos linking to "hidden history" narratives.

FACT: The Star of David, or Magen David, meaning "Shield of David" in Hebrew, is a Jewish symbol rooted in medieval Kabbalah, representing protection and divine harmony. Its earliest known Jewish use appears on a 7th-century BCE seal from Tyre, Lebanon, and later in 3rd-4th-century synagogue decorations, though alongside non-Jewish symbols. Adopted as a Jewish emblem in the 14th century when Prague's Jews chose it for their flag, it was later embraced by the Zionist movement and is now on Israel's flag. While the hexagram appears in other cultures (e.g., as a Buddhist meditation aid or Islamic "Seal of Solomon"), claims of pagan or satanic origins, or links to child sacrifice, are baseless. These misinterpretations, often tied to biblical references like "Remphan," lack archaeological or historical evidence and are antisemitic fabrications spread to delegitimize Jewish identity.
